PENAL CODE (AMENDMENT) ACT 1984

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

The Act amends Section 46 of the Penal Code (Cap 67) which deals with the power of the courts to impose community service orders instead of sentencing convicted persons to terms of imprisonment. Section 46 as it now stands provides that community service shall be for not less than 40 nor more than 150 days. This Act seeks to give the courts the power to impose any sentence of upto 300 days. Provision is further made for the notification of community service orders to the Superintendent of Prisons and the officer charged with supervising the order.
