## Customs By-law No. 1.<sup>(1)</sup>

### KINDERGARTEN MATERIALS.

#### Tariff Item 111.

(By-law operates on and from 1st July, 1934.)

The following articles may be admitted free under Item 111 of the *Customs Tariff, 1934*,<sup>(2)</sup> as articles used solely in the Kindergarten system of teaching:—

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**Customs By-law No. 2.**<sup>(3)</sup>

COLLECTION OF ANTIQUITIES FOR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS.

Tariff Item 114.

(By-law operates on and from 1st July, 1934.)

Collections of Antiquities for Public Institutions may be admitted free under Item 114 of the *Customs Tariff*, 1934,<sup>(2)</sup> upon the production to the Collector of a certificate from a responsible official of the Institution that the goods are to be used therein for exhibition purposes only.

**Customs By-law No. 3.**<sup>(4)</sup>

GOODS EXPORTED FOR REPAIRS.

Tariff Item 125.

(By-law operates on and from 1st July, 1934.)

In order to obtain re-admission under Item 125 of the *Customs Tariff*, 1934,<sup>(2)</sup> upon payment of duty on the dutiable value only of any repairs or additions to the goods, the following conditions must have been complied with:—

1. The Department must, prior to shipment, have been satisfied that the repairs or additions could not have been reasonably done in the Territory.
2. That prior to being packed for shipment or post the goods were inspected by an officer.
3. That an Export Entry was made and passed.

**Customs By-law No. 4.**<sup>(5)</sup>

MACHINERY FOR AERIAL TRAMWAYS.

Tariff Item 67.

(By-law operates on and from 1st July, 1934.)

The following materials may be admitted free under Item 67 of the *Customs Tariff*, 1934,<sup>(2)</sup> as materials for use solely in connection with the construction and working of Aerial Tramways:—

**Customs By-law No. 5.<sup>(6)</sup>**

**GIFTS FOR MISSION PURPOSES.**

**Tariff Item 47.**

The following articles or goods being gifts sent to Mission Societies, or any approved association or person carrying on welfare work, for free distribution amongst, or use by or for natives of the Territory, may be admitted free of duty upon production to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry of a detailed list (in the form set out hereunder)\* showing quantities and values; such list to bear a certificate by a responsible person beyond the Territory that the outside packages contain only such goods or articles as are named hereunder, that they are for use only by or for natives, and that they are not second-hand:—

1. Biscuits, fancy
2. Blue, laundry
3. Cakes and Puddings
4. Confectionery
5. Flour
6. Foods, infant and invalid
7. Jams
8. Meats and Soups
9. Milk, including Cream
10. Seeds, garden
11. Soap, common and fancy
12. Apparel and Attire
13. Blankets and Rugs
14. Drapery
15. Gauze Bandages
16. Hats
17. Lint, Cotton Wool
18. Nets and Netting, mosquito
19. Sewing Cottons and Silks
20. Wool, mending
21. Beads
22. Drugs, Chemicals and Oils of every description (including spirituous) used as medicines but not including "Dangerous Drugs," i.e. Medicinal Opium, Morphine, Cocaine, Heroin, the Salts of Morphine, the Salts of Cocaine, the Salts and preparations of Heroin which contain more than one-tenth per centum of Heroin. All preparations (official or non-official including remedies which are advertised as anti-opium remedies) which contain more than one-fifth per centum of Morphine or more than one-tenth per centum of Cocaine. All new derivatives of Morphine or of Cocaine, or their respective Salts, and every other alkaloid of Opium which

### Customs By-law No. 6.<sup>(7)</sup>

Tariff Item No. 47 (b).

(By-law operates on and from 15th July, 1941.)

The following goods or articles as specified in the Schedule hereto sent to approved representatives of His Majesty's Forces for free distribution to members of His Majesty's Forces may be admitted free of duty upon production to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry of a detailed list showing quantities and values. Such list must bear a certificate by a responsible person beyond the Territory that the outside packages contain only such goods or articles as are named hereunder and that such goods or articles are in fact forwarded by the representative of an approved Association or Society carrying on welfare work and are in fact for free distribution to members of His Majesty's Forces and that no second-hand goods are contained in the packages.
